# **Baby Learning Programs: Investing in Families**



Just a few days old, baby Danette began experiencing difficulty sleeping and eating. Her mother, Jackeling explains, "We worried all the time because we did not know what was wrong with her. I was so worried and depressed. I felt like a bad mother."

Mentally and physically exhausted, Jackeling enrolled in the *Safe Passages Baby Learning Playgroups.* Through the program, Jackeling received assistance finding a medical specialist for her daughter. The family learned that Danette had an undiagnosed

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The mission of Safe Passages is to advocate for children, youth, and families with special emphasis on vulnerable populations.

To accomplish this mission Safe Passages develops public policy, evaluates programs, conducts research, breathing dissorder that was not allowing her to nurse or sleep properly. The case manager helped Jackeling with enrolling for health benefits so that the baby could get the surgery she needed.

Jackeling explains, "After the surgery, Danette is a much happier baby. I stopped feeling guilty and now know that I am a good mother."

During the Baby Learning Playgroup, Jackeling also learned of the services provided by Early Head Start. "I learned how important it is for babies to learn to play with other children and to have caring adults around them, so I enrolled Dannette in daycare. It also gave me an opportunity to go back to school to gain more skills and improve my English."

Because Jackeling was able to enroll baby Danette in Early Head Start, she was able to return to school. She is now a certified Dental Assistant and is completing her service hours.

Danette, now one year old, is expressive, happy and healthy.

**About the Baby Learning Communities Collaborative Program.** The BLCCP is a partnership between Safe Passages, Family Paths, Through the Looking Glass, Jewish Family and Community Services, The Central American Refugee Committee (CRECE), Oakland Unifed Schools, and the City of Oakland Fund for Children and Youth (OFCY). Families with young children participate in community playgroups, parent education, and case management. The program focuses on low income families exposed to community and domestic violence.

## **Elev8 Provides Families with Access to the Legal System**

The organization works in the areas of Violence Prevention, Early Childhood, School Linked Services, Juvenile Justice and Career Pathways.



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I heard there were lawyers in my son's school from a friend. I was desperate for help. I was stuck. I had no papers. Safe Passages implements Elev8, a full service community school initiative at five middle school campuses in Oakland. A unique and exemplary support provided through this multi-prong initiative are legal services provided by the East Bay Community Law Center (EBCLC).

EBCLC Staff Attorney and Clinical Instructor, Rosa Bay, explains the services, "By far, immigration is the most common legal issue that arises. We are able to provide general immigration consultations and representation in U Visa cases, which are Visas for victims of serious crimes."

In one case, Ms. Bay and a law student helped a single mother of four and her teenage son apply for the U Visa based on having suffered years of unimaginable domestic violence.

In addition, several families have also received assistance with appealing adverse determinations relating to public benefits programs like CalWORKs, Food Stamps (CalFresh), and Medi-Cal. In one case, a single mother's Food Stamp benefits were cut off without notice due to an administrative error. She received representation and was able to get her benefits reinstated.

Since the inception of the Elev8 Legal Services Project, approximately 300 families have accessed legal services and attended workshops at schools on topics such as education, consumer and tenants rights, access to college for undocumented students, and the U Visa.



Since its founding in 1988 by law students at UC Berkeley's Boalt Hall School of Law, EBCLC has become the largest provider of free legal services in the East Bay and a nationally-recognized poverty law clinic. The Elev8 Legal Services Project seeks to support and promote the education, health, and empowerment of Oakland middle school students and their communities. 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These are some of the notes written by middle school students being tutored and mentored by Rebecca Heston, a Safe Passages Elev8 AmeriCorps Volunteer at San Lorenzo Unified. The program has significantly improved academic performance amongst youth tutored while providing profound learning opportunites for the AmeriCorps members.

Rebecca explains, "I never cease to be amazed by my students. The progress they make with just a few kind words and tutoring support is astounding. A girl who was painfully shy was able to organize her class today to give me a surprise. A boy who acted out and had many behavioral issues, hugged me today!"

AmeriCorps members serve for one year at Oakland or San Lorenzo middle schools through the Safe Passages Elev8 program. Members receive intensive training and ongoing coaching to deliver lesson plans to support students struggling in math and language arts.

"With a 5 to one teacher to student ratio, students are able to receive the individualized academic support they need to be successful learners,"explains Demetrie Broxton, Director of the Elev8 AmeriCorps Program.

The program focuses on providing tutoring and mentoring to the most underperforming students in state tests. Preliminary independent evaluations show that after one year in the program, over 60% of students demonstrated a functional grade level improvement in reading.
